I kept it in working order for twenty years.

Upgraded to a Canon Rebel DSLR about 10 years ago. Then to a Canon 6D about 5. I keep 3 all purpose lenses. For most of our "regular" travel (we travel a LOT) I take a Canon G15 and an old iPhone. We mostly take our big trips carry-on to keep it easy. Every once in a while, though, I'll take a photo trip and lug it all around.

I was fortunate to meet Dan Anderson in Wisconsin and took my first trip with him in 2007. The most recent was Puglia, Italy, in 2022. He apprenticed with Ansel Adams. In addition to some really great stories, I

Lately I've been lazy about this hobby. I'm hoping to rekindle some of that initial wonder by participating in the club. I also dabble in some interesting ways to print my work including applying images to birch veneer and overpainting images printed to canvas.

1st - 8.5 -Ron Bautsch-Nice capture of a great story. Image is sharp except the wings of the top bird.



2nd – 7.8 -Ron Bautsch – Great story. Sharp image. The image may have been "over-denoised" that all details



 $\underline{Advanced}$ 1st -8.0 – Frank Barnhart-Nice capture of the airshow. Crop tighter so more details of the plane can be seen. Maker can consider flipping the image to show the planes flying horizontally so plane details can be more visible. Increase contrast to stand out the airplanes.



2nd - 7.6 - Frank Barnhart -The image is generally sharp. Nice color combination. For a more impactful and artistic image, consider a wider aperture with emphasis only on one or two flowers.



3rd-7.5 – John Steen- Good capture of the sport. Consider shooting from the front of the athlete to avoid the background distractions and create stronger impact. It will also show the athlete's expression better.



Masters

1st – 9.0 – Dick Remski-Nice sharp image. The blur showing the motion of the hand is acceptable. Maker may consider darken the metal rod on the top left side the image. It is quite distracting above the head of the subject.



 $2nd - 8.0 - Clay\ Hodson$ -Beautiful Bison. It is relatively sharp. Maker may consider opening up the shadow slightly to bring out more details of the fur. Adjust the contrast and brightness to even out the lights between the head and the body of the bison.



3rd – 8.0 – Jerry Schlesinger-Adjust the white light on the top of the image which draws attention to. It would be good if part of the hand and the leg is not cut off.



A special congratulations to all the winners! It is very interesting to logon to the website and review all of the photo's submitted. We all make statements regarding the judge's comments, and I've made my share of them. Usually, these judges have a wealth of experience and I respect their experience. May I suggest returning to your photos submitted and applying the comments made to your photos. This is a good way we all can learn from one another.
